Dear Parents and Caregivers
When people like Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther
King, Mother Theresa and Nelson Mandela are
mentioned, we immediately associate each with a
deep sense of moral purpose. We understand that
their lives were given to the pursuit of certain ideals, at
the heart of which was a passionate commitment to
making the world a better place, a more just place.

Perhaps many people believe that such commitment is for others – for those with some special calling in life — not for the average person, living in suburbia, raising a family, going to work each day, living a 'normal' life. Or perhaps not much thought is given to meaning and purpose midst life's busy-ness.

And yet, without moral purpose, individually or collectively, life can lack direction and focus – like travelling unknown roads without a map or sat-nav. A sense of higher purpose is the vision that recognises our shared humanity, that has us look beyond the borders of our own person, to break down the walls of selfishness, self-centredness and isolation from others. It's about being purposeful in making a difference, not only to one's own life but also to the lives of those within a wider sphere of influence. We do this, not only in the activities to which we give our time, but also in the manner in which we undertake our life tasks, whatever they may be. Moral purpose, then, provides both the ends and the means to a better life for all and, as such, is a shared life task.

This message, of course, is at the heart of the Gospel. Jesus not only spoke about the coming of the Kingdom or Reign of God but also showed us how to live it every day – ends and means. He didn't say that it was a worthy aspiration for a chosen few and beyond the achievement of the majority. No, it is an expectation of each of us and we are here to help each other get there together.

On the two recent Orientation Mornings I spoke about the importance of parents and teachers becoming aware of the ideas, knowledge, values, beliefs and skills that we pass on to young people. Whether we realise it or not, this is how culture evolves over time, how some things become more important than others, how our collective identity is shaped. If this is the case, then we had better become very aware of what seeds we are sowing in the next generation.

Of course, young ones do not primarily find out what is important to their parents, teachers and communities through their words. Words are one thing and committed action another. As the saying goes, 'Actions speak louder than word.' What, then, do our actions say about what is important? Do they offer a signpost to our moral purpose? Do they reflect how we see life?

Some parents believe that children should make up their own minds about life questions; that it is not their role to share with their children what is important to them, as if this represented some sort of sinister indoctrination. Of course there have always been those who have carried things to the extreme and this is to be strenuously avoided; however, to fail to pass on the desirable and life-giving aspects of culture to the next generation, is to deprive them of their roots which ground them and provide the guidelines and framework for what is good, worthy, true and beautiful in life.

Sharing the best of culture and what is important in life is the content of parenting and teaching. It enables young ones to start life with clear ideals, acceptable boundaries and a sense of security and safety – both articulated in words and lived through daily action. To fail in this responsibility is to leave young people at the mercy of those whose intentions may not be honourable and who are out for their own advantage. Of course, young people will then make up their own minds as they move into adulthood – as it should be – and they will be far better equipped to do so when they have had the example of caring adults who have shared a sense of meaning and purpose and what truly matters in living an unselfish life.

At Mass on Saturday night, a number of children received the Eucharist for the first time after their confirmation on Friday night. In his homily, Father Joe mentioned the importance of attending Mass as a family. To do so, lets children know that their spiritual formation and faith life is important; that a relationship with God is possible and desirable and gives visible expression to the way life is lived - day in, day out, through all the ups and downs.

Dear Parents/Caregivers,

In my daily reading I came across this extract which I thought quite pertinent to our Virtue of the Week, Idealism, as well as relating to initiatives which this community supports really well. I include it here for your reflection:

"To live in the centre of God's will – to walk, step by step, the path He's prepared for us - is no easy task. At some point in our lives, we each wonder, *Why am I here? What did God make me to do?* 

Too often we look for a big Hollywood blockbuster answer: *I will find a cure for cancer. I will solve world hunger.* While these things are possible, they're unlikely to happen to most of us. Instead God wants us to be sensitive to the opportunities placed in our lives, sometimes on a daily basis, to make a difference for God's kingdom. Do you see someone who needs a good meal or just someone to talk to? Could you help out a co-worker who is burdened with a heavy workload? Big or small, the choices we make to help others are just one part of the puzzle that is the meaning of life. We need to examine our daily lives and consider...maybe God brought us to this very place for such a time as this."
